PROGRAM: FORT SUMTER AND THE BEGINNING OF THE CIVIL WAR
JUNE 12, 2024

Fort Sumter and the Beginning of the Civil War

Join historian Mark Maloy as he describes the standoff in Charleston Harbor and the first battle of the Civil War at Fort Sumter in April of 1861. He will discuss the surprisingly bloodless battle that inaugurated the deadliest war in American history, and how the city of Charleston and Fort Sumter became a target for Union forces for the remainder of the war. He will also discuss the life of the most colorful personalities of the war, the man often credited with firing the first shot of the Civil War, Southern fire-eater Edmund Ruffin.

Mark Maloy is a historian currently working for the National Park Service in Virginia. He holds an undergraduate degree in History from the College of William and Mary and a graduate degree in History from George Mason University. He has worked at numerous public historic sites and archaeological digs for the past fifteen years. Among the sites he has worked at include the Frederick Douglass National Historic Site, the Civil War Defenses of Washington, and Arlington House, The Robert E. Lee Memorial. He began his career with the Park Service at Fort Sumter and Fort Moultrie National Historical Park in Charleston, South Carolina. He has written numerous



articles on the Civil War and is the author of two books on the Revolutionary War: *Victory or Death: The Battles of Trenton and Princeton* and *To the Last Extremity: The Battles for Charleston.*

The Heritage Award Winner is Elizabeth (Beth) Daly

The Civil War Round Table of Fredericksburg is proud to present the 2024 Heritage Award to Elizabeth (Beth) Daly. Beth is an avid Civil War historian.

Beth is now and has been an active member of many history-related organizations, including Central Rappahannock Heritage Center, Historic Fredericksburg Foundation, Fredericksburg Area Museum, Ladies Memorial Association, Friends of Chatham, Stafford County Historical Society and Widewater State Park, just to name a few. Of course, she currently serves as secretary of our organization, a position she has held for 10 out of the past 12 years.

She is a devoted historian and excellent researcher regarding Civil War documents. She was a researcher and transcriber of Civil War letters from the Knox family. The collection was published in partnership with Historic Fredericksburg in 2013 as "The Circle Unbroken: The Civil War Letters of the Knox Family of Fredericksburg."

When tracing her family genealogy, she discovered her great-grandfather was in the Ohio Volunteer Infantry and spent the winter of 1863 camped at Brooke, Virginia, a few miles from where she lives.

She has also researched General Fitzhugh Lee, and he has become one of her favorite Civil War characters.

We appreciate and applaud Beth's gifts as a writer, researcher, board member, and friend to not only the Civil War Round Table of Fredericksburg, but to the many organizations in the area.

Congratulations, Beth, and our heart-felt thanks for all of your contributions to the preservation and significance of history in the Fredericksburg area!

MEMBERSHIP MINUTE



The official "government" recognition day of war dead known as "Memorial Day 2024" is over. But to those of us dedicated to preserving the military and social history of the Civil War, every day is memorial day. We do not need a designated holiday to remember those who fought and died. We do not need a reason to volunteer at National Parks, cemeteries, or battlefields, or to perform other educational and civic duties to our community. As we all know, the Civil War is the origin of Memorial Day. Known as "Decoration Day," the tradition sprang from the overwhelming need to provide a proper resting place for the tens of thousands Union dead in hundreds of communities across the nation. It was not until 1971 that this local and state observance became a national holiday.

Reposted here from Military.com is a good synopsis of the day's origins:

Every year, Americans come together on the last Monday in May to remember our fallen service members. But the timing, traditions and even what we call the holiday are all relatively new.

Memorial Day, as we know, is far from a macabre or morbid tradition. For more than a century, the ritual of visiting cemeteries, memorials and gravesites was the real start of summer. It was an annual act of remembrance, clearing away the dirt and grime from those hallowed markers. It's a time to decorate those personal memorials.

Until 1971, it was known as "Decoration Day."

The years following the end of the Civil War in 1865 saw American communities tending to the remains and graves of an unprecedented number of

war dead. All of the previous wars and conflicts fought by the United States combined would still not add up to the body count produced by the Civil War.

On the first official Decoration Day -- May 30, 1868 -- Ohio Rep. <u>James A.</u> <u>Garfield</u>, a former general and future U.S. president, addressed a crowd of 5,000 gathered at Arlington National Cemetery:

"Hither our children's children shall come to pay their tribute of grateful homage. For this are we met today. By the happy suggestion of a great society, assemblies like this are gathering at this hour in every State in the Union. Thousands of soldiers are today turning aside in the march of life to visit the silent encampments of dead comrades who once fought by their side. From many thousand homes, whose light was put out when a soldier fell, there go forth today to join these solemn processions loving kindred and friends, from whose heart the shadow of grief will never be lifted till the light of the eternal world dawns upon them."

After Garfield spoke, the 5,000 visitors made their way into the cemetery to visit the tens of thousands of graves in the newly formed cemetery. But Decoration Day was not an official holiday. May 30 was a day touted by the Grand Army of the Republic, an association of Union Civil War veterans, as an official day of remembrance for people across the country. The idea was to honor the war's dead by decorating the graves of Union soldiers.

Local municipalities and states adopted resolutions over the following years to make Decoration Day an official holiday in their areas. Each of the former Union states had adopted a Decoration Day by 1890.

As time went on, "Memorial Day" began to supplant "Decoration Day" as the name of the holiday, and it soon became a day to honor all fallen American troops, not just those from the Civil War. After the two World Wars, Memorial Day was the term in more common usage, and the act of remembering all of the fallen took on a renewed importance.

In 1968, the U.S. government passed the Uniform Monday Holiday Act, which put major holidays on specific Mondays to give federal employees three-day weekends. Memorial Day was one of these holidays, along with Washington's Birthday, Labor Day and Columbus Day. The act also codified the name "Memorial Day" into law.

It all went into effect in 1971 and, by then, there were no more Civil War veterans -- but there were millions of vets from later wars.

A recurring theme in these columns is how the many ways and many contributions Civil War Roundtables make to preserving and perpetuating Civil War History. We may not grab the headlines or get credit – credit where credit is due – but in many thousands of ways, our CWRTF members contribute to this cause. Which brings me back to membership --

At some point those of us – *ahem* - advancing in age will not be able to work the battlefield volunteer lines, plant the headstones in the Fredericksburg Confederate Cemetery, or participate in education/restoration/preservation exercises. Yea, to secure the future of the spirit of Decoration Day, it falls to a new generation of Americans to step up and seize the banner of remembrance.

That's where membership comes in. As we enter the busy summer holiday season, let's not forget that September (our next meeting) is but a mere three months away. I urge you to not forget your CWRTF. Continue reaching out to colleagues, friends, neighbors, fellow citizens, and the younger generations, to recruit them into our ranks. Let all of us do our part!
